

Do cables need to be run through conduits when running in cable trays

- Local code or AHJ requirements:** Authorities may mandate conduit even if national standards do not.
- Transitioning from Tray to Equipment** Even when tray cables run openly in trays, conduit or bushed tubing is often used at the point where cables enter equipment to prevent abrasion and debris ingress. This ensures compliance with NEC 392.46 and protects terminations.

Practical Considerations Using conduit adds mechanical protection but also increases labor, material costs, and can reduce heat dissipation, requiring ampacity derating if multiple cables share the same conduit. Cable trays, being open-air, allow better ventilation, easier installation, and future scalability. A common approach is a hybrid system: open cable trays for main distribution and short conduits...
