

How to secure fiber optic cables inside a well

Use Protective Conduits or Innerducts Running fiber optic cables through innerducts or conduits inside the well protects them from physical damage, moisture, and chemical exposure. Use bend radius guides, routing channels, or spools to ensure smooth curves, especially at entry points, corners, or inside the well. Avoid sharp turns and figure-8 loops can be used for coiling slack without twisting the fiber. Manage Tensile Stress Excessive pulling or tension can damage the fiber. Use fiber optic pulling grips to distribute force along the cable jacket, not the fiber itself. For long vertical runs, consider intermediate pull points or clamps to reduce continuous tension. Apply strain relief at termination points and along the well to prevent the cable from bearing its own weight or being pulled during maintenance. Minimize Mechanical Pressure and Environmental Exposure Avoid crushing or impact by securing the cable at frequent intervals using clamps or brackets that do not exceed the cable's long-term load rating. Ensure the well is free of sharp edges, debris, or objects that could damage the cable.
