

What are the different colors of outdoor optical cables

Jacket Colors for Outdoor Fiber Cables

Other custom colors: Some manufacturers provide jackets in RAL colors or with printed legends for specific projects or branding purposes.

Fiber Identification Inside the Cable

Within the cable, individual fibers are also color-coded according to the TIA/EIA-598-C standard to simplify installation, maintenance, and splicing:

- Standard 12-color sequence:** Blue, Orange, Green, Brown, Slate, White, Red, Black, Yellow, Violet, Rose, Aqua.
- For cables with more than 12 fibers,** the sequence repeats with stripes or tube-based coding to maintain unique identification.
- Special sequences exist** for high-density or European standards, such as 16-fiber MPO connectors using Olive, Magenta, Tan, and Lime for fibers 13–16.
